First, I would like to thank the members of Gateway Rifle & Pistol Club for electing me as club president. I am sure it will take me a meeting or two to get my "sea legs." I appreciate all of your support in the coming year ahead.

I would like to bring you up to speed since the last MUZZLEBLAST.

Two new BOD members were added: Jerry Vaughn and Mike Overbay.

At the September general meeting, three motions were presented. These motions could not have a final vote because they was not presented in writing 15 days before the general election (due to the fact there was not a MUZ-ZLEBLAST).

The first motion was to eliminate the editor as a board of director position. This would allow us to pay an editor to perform this function and not be in conflict with the bylaws stating BOD not receiving monetary compensation.

The second motion was to change the date on the annual meeting in the bylaws to a date to be determined by the board of directors annually.

The third motion was to drop the requirement to submit all bylaw changes to the NRA. The NRA no longer requires this. Because of apparent discrepancies in the record keeping

of the Bylaws, the board of directors collected all versions/editions and researched any changes in order to have a copy true to the history of the GRPC, its BOD meetings and general membership meetings.

The BOD discovered that the editor position was never approved by the general membership as a board of director seat. Therefore, the motion, concerning the editor position, placed before the general membership in September was unnecessary.

The other two motions will be voted on at the next general membership meeting.

The BOD decided to hire an editor. Marsha Kerr agreed to take on this task for a nominal fee. Please submit your articles to Marsha. She did a great job in the past, but she can not put to together a paper without your input.

The BOD also decided to hire a Webmaster and create a website. Our website is www.grpc-jax.org.

The BOD also updated the New Members booklet so it is accurate to club policies and bylaws. The New Members' booklet is not to be handed out until the new members attend class. A condensed informational sheet will be given out until the orientation class is attended.

As many may have noticed, there were some changes approved to the club itself. The 200 yard rifle line has been expanded by moving the berm. Some disciplines have been affected by this change and the BOD is addressing / correcting the problems as the problems are brought to our attention.

Additional Connex boxes have been purchased to accommodate the

growing needs of the shooting disciplines on the all purpose ranges.

The club office has been moved to expand the store. The Club office/store will have security cameras installed for protection of the club, its members and its employees.

Several trees were removed to expand the garage and remove those struck by lightening.

Finally, be sure to thank the sponsors of the Women's Field Day in November: Smith and Wesson, Action Gun, Cassat Gun, Green Acres Shooting Supply, White's Country Cabin, Woody's barbeque 103rd St, US Army

About the SMALLBORE LINE Behind the SHORT PISTOL LINES

The club built a small-bore (.22 rimfire) line behind the 7.5 and 15 yard pistol lines a couple of years ago.

The intended uses of this range were:

A place for .22 shooters to enjoy without also enjoying the noise, blast and hair-flattening signature of the ".388 MeatAxe Magnum Mastodon Mangler" rifles on the 100 yd rifle line;

A range for our competitive junior and adult .22 shooters to practice at 50 ft, 50 yards, 50 meters, and 100 yards with standard target frames and regulation targets;

A safe place for young shooters to learn the basics of rifle shooting;

A range for .22 shooters when the front small-bore line is occupied with a competition.

This range was NEVER intended for general "plinking" and shooting at any type of target at any range, yet we have found well shot up clothespins,

"transformer" toys, metal can lids, toy soldiers, and even golf balls on the range. I can't personally think of a more ideal object than a golf ball to bounce a bullet out of the range. These objects have been found from 50 feet to 75 yards in front of the firing line, which virtually guarantees the .22 bullets are skipping over the berm at 100+ yards.

One unnamed virtuoso took the time to put 12 rounds of .22 through the left leg of a proper frame, in order to chop it down. Vandalism at best. Loss of membership for life if I had my way.

This range is restricted to members only. Only club members who have been through the Club's safety and range familiarization course are permitted on the range.

Likewise, the range is restricted to .22 rimfire rifles only to be more certain of bullet placement/control than can usually be derived from handgun use.

Not so far away north of the berm is an active general aviation airport. It will take **1.00000** round on ground there for the FAA to bust us into a knitting society in less time than it takes to clean your rifle.

Please, think! Ground targets are not acceptable unless they are very close to the 100 yd berm. Swingers are reactive targets also. When you miss a swinger or reactive target, the bullet hits the dirt at an angle favorable for

ricocheting over the berm. Remember your high school geometry. Angle "in" is generally less than angle "out" for non-elastic collisions, meaning the bullet clears the berm and is no longer under your control.

You are responsible for the control of every bullet you launch downrange. Abso-

lutely.

This range is a very enjoyable place to shoot .22's. The construction of the cover keeps it cool and comfortable in the height of the summer, and it is usually not crowded.

We need the cooperation of the membership and their guests to keep this range open. It will take very little more of the "trash shooting" and vandalism to get a recommendation to the Board of Directors to close this range for anything but formal competition.

Members, this is your Club. Everyone is a range officer. If you see someone acting irresponsibly, and are not comfortable confronting them, go to the office and report all you see, including license tag number, approximate age and number of persons, etc.

Annual Gateway Regional Classic IX

The weekend of January 12, 2002, brought the Glock Sports Shooting Foundation back to Jacksonville for its Annual Gateway Regional Classic IX. This premier two-day event is hosted by The Gateway Rifle and Pistol Club and brings Glock pistol shooters from all over the Eastern half of the United States.

It is one of twenty-seven regional or state outdoor matches authorized by Glock, which are intended to provide a safe, fun, "user friendly" sport-handgun shooting discipline.

There were 381 entries in seven different divisions, which ranks this match second in attendance only to Glock's "Nationals" in Atlanta, Georgia. Three out of the seven divisions were won by members of the South East Practical Shooters Association, which speaks volumes about the quality of our club shooters. Each winner, as well as one of the range helpers, won a new Glock of their choice in a drawing.

This year's range volunteers were provided jointly through three Gateway Action Pistol clubs, SEPSA, IDPA and Cowford Regulators. Not a shot could have been fired if it were not for these many volunteers that donated Friday afternoon, all day Saturday and all day Sunday. Their days usually started before dawn and ran well after dark. They served excellent meals for the whole weekend, parked cars, ran score sheets, worked the nine stages of fire, set up stages and tents, tore down stages and tents, hauled garbage and the list goes on and on. Excellent direction was provided by Gateway Board Members, Gateway Club Officers, and Officers from the action clubs.

The weekend weather was typical Florida, cool in the mornings with a lot of dew and then sunny and warm. The stages were handled quickly and professionally with very little back up of shooters. Everybody had a weekend full up to the brim of fun and left looking forward to next years shoot.

Come join us! Bring a lot of bullets and expect to see a lot more targets on the each stage! 
So the second Saturday will find me having even more fun taking advantage of the exciting event the SEPSA people put on.

Rimfire Benchrest got off to a great start this year. Last December, we were able to expand to 20 benches and host the Rimfire Benchrest Association Nationals- \$4000 in prizes and a great time.

We are now sanctioned by that organization; we routinely shoot on the first Saturday of the month at 10 AM (practice at 9 AM). Our monthly matches are IR 50/50 (U.S. Rimfire Association); 30 minutes to put one shot in each of 25 bulls; unlimited sighters- one shot per bull. The X is 1/32".

In the Sporter class, we use a 7.5 lb or less rifle with a 6.5X scope and a wooden stock with a convex fore-end.

The heavy classes are shot with unlimited scopes, a flat fore-end (up to 3" wide) and weighing less than 10.5 and 13.5 lb respectively.

Sounds complicated- to put it simply, if you have a 10/22, or the likes, under 7.5 lbs with a scope of less than 6.5X, you can shoot all three classes.
