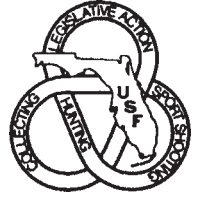

What's happening at the Club Store?

Some of you have noticed that the Club store is making changes and wonder what is happening. The answer is not simple and may surprise a few people. Throughout most of 2001 through 2003, our Club had a good investment savings account and a very healthy checking account to pay monthly expenses. We averaged about \$55,000 in Club store inventory and averaged about \$6,000 per month in store purchases. We could afford to stock whatever we thought desirable without worrying about the cost or return on investment. In 2003 and early 2004, we spent about \$70,000 in a lead removal project, berm rebuilding and range safety measures, plus another \$15,000 or so later this year. At the same time, our operational costs began to rise. We hired and have a very excellent office and maintenance staff who deserve a decent wage.

As we added the range safety officer program, so rose our payroll costs and payroll taxes of FICA, SUTA and FUTA. Property taxes increased. Yes, we pay taxes. In fact, the only tax we do not pay is the federal tax on our income which is tax exempt. We also spent a lot more money on Club activities that provide little, if any, monetary return. This past summer, our checking account was depleted. We borrowed over \$50,000 from our investment savings which was making a very good interest, and to date, have still not replaced that money. Meanwhile, we had almost \$55,000 in store inventory that in large part continued to just sit on the shelves. Among several cost saving measures implemented, was a very close look at our Club store. With money in short supply, we simply could not afford to buy the quantity of items we formerly kept on hand. Payroll, taxes, insurance and utilities take first priority. A detailed look at purchasing and cost analysis revealed that many fast selling items were being sold virtually at cost and, in some cases, actually below cost when our real overhead was factored in. Frankly, we had and still have inventory that is slow moving and provides little return on our investment. Using our computer based program, we are now able to determine what items sell well and what sells poorly. We are still working in this area and ask for your understanding and patience.

In making some hard decisions on the Club store, several key guidelines were considered. Among them are the following:

1. Club policy # 4, dated 1989, deals with the store's operation. The Club store is not intended to be in competition with local merchants. Its primary purpose is to be a convenience to Club members for basic calibers of fixed ammunition (loaded ammo ready to fire) and common reloading components. We look for a gross mark up of 10% to 15%. We will never be able to carry everything in inventory that all our Club members use or want to buy. A local store like "Green Acres" will give you an idea of the inventory that might be required.
2. With the exception of clothing with the Club's logo, everything we have or have ever had in inventory can be purchased elsewhere. It is available on the private market from local stores or companies such as Midway, Natchez, Champion and Cabela's with a phone call and credit card. It may be a surprise to most that the Club pays the same price to these suppliers that you as an individual pay when making a minimum order. Our freight charges are added into our sale price. You too may have to pay freight charges on out of state orders but you do not pay the local sales tax of 7% the Club has to charge.
3. It is true that the Club through mass purchasing of some items such as bulk bullets can make them available to members in small quantities at an attractive price. Unfortunately, two of our bulk bullet manufacturers went

Disorderly Conduct

It is a shame that this article has to be written. Also, I seriously doubt that those affected will ever read this article but it will serve to inform our Club members of a potentially dangerous safety problem. Our Range Safety Officers (RSO) were hired to and instructed to monitor the Club's firing lines with regard to safety, Club rules in general and proof of Club membership. Of the three, safety is by far the most important. Recently, on two occasions, our Range Safety Officers instructed two different individuals to cease an unsafe practice. On those occasions, the individuals involved told the RSO in so many words that the RSO could not tell them what to do since they were Club members. They are wrong. Club Policy # 8 covers this type situation and how to avoid confrontations.

The Board of Directors empowered the RSO's to enforce Club rules and safety in general. If a RSO, or for that matter, any Club member, observes an unsafe act or practice, the person performing the unsafe act or practice is to be told to cease immediately. That should be the end of the matter. However, if the person continues the unsafe act in direct violation of being told to stop, that person is to be instructed to leave the Club property. If the person or persons refuse to leave, that is Club disorderly conduct and legal trespassing. The RSO or senior Club member present, (see Club Policy # 12) will call the local police. The person involved will then be escorted off of Club property by the police and/or issued a written notice

CLUB POLICY # 52 (Safety Line)

December 13, 2004

The following new safety policy was sponsored by Dave Rifkin and approved by the Board of Directors at the December, 2004, meeting and is effective immediately.

RE: Range Rule Requiring all Shooters to Remain Clear of Firing Lines and Firing Line Benches While a Range is in the Cold or Safe Condition

This rule is designed to improve range safety at Gateway. Frequently shooters are observed handling firearms at the firing line while the range is Cold/Safe. This often occurs unintentionally while shooters are standing at the line and handling their other shooting equipment. At other times, shooters don't understand the range rules. Range officers are not provided full time at any ranges, which increases the likelihood of violations. When shoot-

of trespassing. Depending on circumstances, that written charge may be amended to trespassing with a firearm. The incident thereafter will be investigated by the Board of Directors. The net result could be suspension or loss of Club membership or even legal action.

If you are instructed by a RSO to do something or to cease an act, please politely comply immediately. If you think the RSO is in error, please refer the matter to any Club officer, Board Member, Business Manager or Chief Range Safety Officer. A written complaint is preferred and blank incident reports are available in the Club office. The matter will be investigated by the Board or its appointee. You will receive an answer. The key is to comply at the time and file a complaint afterwards.

I hope we have no more such incidents. However, we, the Club membership, cannot afford to have our Club jeopardized by the actions of a single individual.

out of business and the few still in business raised their prices. Where possible, we will continue to provide those type items. However, the Club cannot afford to stock a pet reload with "X" primers, "Y" powder and "Z" bullets for Club member "Joe Marksman" and maybe a few of his buddies. What is good for one or a few members should also be good for all members. Good examples of unnecessary stock are steel shot, shotgun primers, black powder, 8 mm ammo and uncommon calibers of brass cases. We have Club members who use fairly large quantities of these items but they pool orders, order in bulk from suppliers with shipment to their home addresses. There is no advantage for the Club to make these special orders. Members should not expect the Club to subsidize their hobby.

Well, there it is. The situation is a bit more complicated than most of you thought. Again we ask your patience and understanding as we establish a basic inventory of commonly used, fast selling items on which we can make a decent return on our investment.

ers are downrange and look back at the firing line, they cannot tell if a shooter is handling firearms or other equipment. This causes great concern (and for good reason) for those downrange.

This rule will be enforced by range officers and observed by all shooters at Gateway.

1. When the firing line on a particular range is in the Cold or Safe condition, all shooters will be required to remain clear of the firing line and firing line benches.

2. To accomplish this, a red safety line will be painted behind the firing line/benches at a distance to preclude access to firearms and shooting equipment on the bench. Where practical, the line should be positioned so that shooters can still remain under the roof in the event of inclement weather.

3. On ranges where it is not practical to affix a permanent safety line, shooters will be required to remain "clear" of the firing line/benches while the line is Cold or Safe. In this case, the term "clear" will mean that the shooter will remain far enough from his/her equipment on the bench or firing line so as not to be physically able to handle it.

4. Before a range is called Cold or Safe, all shooters will be physically behind the red safety line or, for ranges with no safety lines, clear of the firing

line/benches as described in #3 above. Only at this time, and after all shooters have declared that their firearms are in a safe/cold condition, the range may be called Cold.

5. During the period when the range is Cold, shooters may service their targets and pick up brass around the firing line, after which they will move to behind the red safety line (or remain clear where there is no line). They will not handle any equipment on shooting benches or at the firing line during this time. Only after all shooters and other personnel are behind the red safety line (or are clear where there is no line) will the line be declared Hot again.

6. Exception: During matches where match personnel control the firing line, the match director may waive this rule. This is necessary since in some disciplines, access to firing line equipment is necessary during the entire course of a match to prepare for the next course of fire. Where equipment access is not necessary, the match director may use this rule to enhance safety at his/her discretion.
