The State of Gateway

At this year's Annual Meeting we had unusually bad weather for November here in Florida with high winds and very cold rain. The winds were gusting up to 30 mph and we even had to cancel the tent we had ordered to facilitate social distancing during the meeting. Because of the weather, we had very low attendance at the meeting so I'm writing this summary on "The State of Gateway" for those who didn't attend.

During the President's address, I reported that the club is doing well in spite of the continuing ammo shortage, COVID-19 and inflation pressures. Club renewals are only off by about 12% from 2020 (which was a record breaking year for membership) and we currently have just over 4,000 members at Gateway. Many clubs I've talked with have experienced a 30-40% drop in membership due to the ammo shortage. Due to financial pressures on our members, the Board of Directors (BOD) recently decided to hold 2022 dues at the current \$160. I also reported on the land acquisition of approximately 2 acres directly across from our exit as a buffer zone to prevent encroachment on the range and reported on numerous range improvements including completion of installing fans on the Silhouette and Rifle Ranges, baffle rebuilds, security camera upgrades, and the improved quiz for the safety video. I'm sure everyone has seen the new housing developments near us on Noroad and there are several large tracts of land very

close to the club that are pending development. If we had not purchased the 9-acre and 2-acre lots just south of us, they too would soon be under development and the last thing the club needs is new apartments or houses adjacent to our property.

Each year the club President has the privilege of recognizing someone with the "Steven Bernhard Award" (named in honor of a club founder) for outstanding contributions to Gateway. This year the award was given to Sam Grimes in recognition of his 55 years of continuous service on the BOD. Sam has served in many roles ranging from President to selecting and handing out door prizes at the Annual Meeting.

This year I also had the privilege of recognizing Brenda Trickler for 20 years of outstanding service to the club. Brenda is an extremely dedicated employee who has served in roles ranging from store clerk to her current role as Business Manager where her responsibilities range from paying club bills, stocking the club store

(that's a tough one these days), supporting Federal and State audits, and hiring and scheduling office employees.

Sue Carter, Club Treasurer, gave the Financial Report for 2020. Sue reported details of club income and expenses and the bottom line is that we are maintaining our cash reserves to keep the club financially healthy. The report was approved at the meeting and a copy is available for member review in the club office.

Charles Preston, Club Secretary, facilitated the election as follows: Given no opposition, Randy Erickson was elected President, Bill Edwards was elected Vice President, Sue Carter was elected Treasurer, Charles Preston was elected Secretary, and Bill Blackwell was elected Public Relations Officer by acclamation. Tim Allen, Gary Kight, and Bill King were all elected to 3 year Director positions and Wade Olyer was elected to the 2 year Director position created by a resignation. POST ELECTION UPDATE: I had a major senior moment during the election process/writing the ballot and forgot that when Bill Edwards took on the Vice President position, it opened up a 5th Director vacancy. Since Carl Berg was the next director candidate in line by vote count, he gets the other 2 year Director position. My sincere apologies to Carl and my thanks to Bill King for drawing that to my attention.

This year Alan Rosner arranged for State Attorney Melissa Nelson to be our guest speaker. She addressed the membership with a detailed presentation on Jacksonville's approach of using social media for targeting known violent criminals for prosecution. It seems some convicted felons have an overwhelming urge to post videos of themselves in possession of firearms on the internet and this evidence was used to

put them back in jail. This has resulted in a 28% drop in our murder rate in contrast to other large cities seeing 100-200% increases in murder rates. The Honorable Brian Davis (a United States District Judge of the United States District Court for the Middle District of Florida) also attended the Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting ended with Sam Grimes awarding numerous door prizes and with a catered BBQ lunch.

Courtesy and Safety

Courtesy and safety, these two things are essential at any shooting venue. During the COVID years, we have had challenges in running the club and we have looked forward to each new year as the one that would bring 'normal' back to us. Hasn't happened yet. We have managed well and before the new safety and courtesy problems, things seemed to be getting better. Ammo is available; components, not so much. There are more shooters coming out and Daily Members have been coming back. So let's look at a problem we can do something about...Incident reports.

In most cases, unsafe shooting or using a gun which is prohibited on that range starts the event. If a Range Officer or another member cautions the shooter and they settle down and aim, or move to a proper range, no incident. When the shooter continues to misbehave or refuses to go to another range, it becomes an incident. They may think what they are doing is no big deal, or think it is a stupid rule. That doesn't matter. We are talking safety here. If they refuse to behave, they are asked to leave and an incident report is made. We have had to call police and we usually get prompt service. This is also done in case of theft. Sounding like the geezer I am, I was on the old 25/50-yard line years ago when someone had left a shooting box sitting there. You know, the kind the Bullseye shooters use; it had everything you'd need to compete in the box. I took it to the office and Warren called the guy and asked if he had forgotten anything. I think if that happened now, likely the box would be turned in; a lot of stuff is turned in to lost and found and we try to locate the owner. Anyway you'd want others to turn in your stuff. If they don't, we have video to see what happened.

Safety issues are what get clubs closed down. We have invested a lot in the barriers to keep the bullets from getting out. In fact, modifications to the 100-yard line next to the 200-yard line have just been made when we discovered a way bullets could skip over the berm. This was noticed when bullet impacts were found where they should not be. The modifications we are making will enable shooters to use this line while keeping all the bullets in the range. The baffles, billboards, berms and deflectors all help and the need is confirmed when you see all the bullet marks in unlikely places. How many times have you noticed one of these and wondered...How did that get there? Well, our maintenance crew wonders exactly that and sometimes changes need to be made. A part of the baffle system is protection against the rounds that are likely to be used on a range. Some ranges are pistol. Some are rifle. Simple isn't it. Well maybe not simple enough. The silhouette line is designed for .22 rimfire rifles and pistol rounds. Some of the pistol bays allow rifles using centerfire pistol cartridges, usually lever rifles. They can be used by AR platform rimfires but not bottleneck centerfire rifles. You may have noticed a lot of signs about this. If you aim at the target and use a combination that is safe on that range, the chances of a problem are reduced.

I'm sure you have also noticed that the city is finding its way here. There are new developments in progress all over and we want NOT to be a concern to our neighbors. The properties we have purchased the last two years are buffers to protect us from encroachment. We want to be good neighbors.

On the topic of courtesy, we want to be accommodating to other shooters. We ask if we can get a cold line,

thanking the others when there is agreement. We don't ask for a cold line every 5 minutes to work our target. Be prepared to shoot when you come to the range. If someone isn't prepared and asks for help, do what you would want them to do were you in the same situation. When the line is cold, step back if you aren't going down range and don't mess with your firearms. If you aren't downrange and someone approaches the bench or the table their guns are on, caution them. I'm sure most have good intentions but accidents are reduced when no one is messing with guns when the line is cold.

The things we learn about safe shooting become good habits over the years and you do them without thinking. We've all seen someone on the line swing a gun when taking it off the line or maybe asking for help. DON'T do that! If you see it done, go to the shooter and explain gun handling to them. It takes a while but when a new shooter learns that all around them are practicing safe handling and gets comfortable being at the range, we have a new gun nut...and that's what we hope for.

The more shooters there are the better!

Ladies Day 2021

On Saturday, Nov 20th, 100 women participated in Ladies Day at Gateway, hosted by Gateway Rifle & Pistol Club. The annual event provides the ladies with an orientation to safe gun handling, and gives them training



with pistols, air rifles, the AR-15 rifle, and cowboy action shooting.

It was a full day of fun for the ladies. We started with a welcome from Gateway's Board member Allen Way, and a welcome from Ted Carter, president of Florida Sport Shooting Association and NRA Board member. Sue Carter, Ladies Day Coordinator and NRA Certified Instructor, gave the safety orientation, discussing the four rules of safe gun handling and what they mean.



After the safety brief, the women were split into five groups. They rotated through the different stations to sample several different styles of shooting.

On the air gun range the women were instructed how to shoot air rifles at a distance of 10 meters. The range was inside, so everyone stayed cool and comfortable. Marion Estes and the coaches gave a brief lesson on how the air rifle worked, and basic sight alignment and trigger squeeze. Although the targets were small, they did very well.



This year we welcomed Jessica Dunning from the Defensive Empowerment Academy in Tampa. Jess presented her Situational Awareness and Non-Lethal Defense class. Everyone came away with a new appreciation for the skills of

observation! The ladies learned tips and tricks, as well as non-lethal tools they can use to keep themselves safer.

At the pistol range, the ladies shot .22 caliber pistols at 7 yards, standing and using two hands. They were separated into two relays, allowing the coaches to have only one student at a time. After an orientation on the firearm, safe gun handling, and loading and unloading,

the women had the opportunity to show their skills. The coaches reviewed the fundamentals of a good shot, position, grip, sight



alignment, sight picture, breathing, trigger squeeze and follow through. Shooting iron sights, the goal was to learn to group their shots anywhere on the target.



Cowboy action shooting was a big hit for the ladies. Sheriff Misfire Mordecai and his gang did a great job of introducing the women to the period dress and the firearms of the era. They

had the chance to shoot revolvers, rifles and shotguns at different distances and at fun targets. The patience and thoughtfulness of the Cowford Regulators working with the ladies helped many overcome their personal fears of the firearms and shoot pretty darn well with them!



On the rifle range, the ladies learned what an AR-15 was, how it worked, the different calibers available and why it was so much fun to shoot. Jane

Cebulskie and her coaches reviewed the safety rules and the fundamentals of a good shot.



The ladies were seated and used either a tripod on the rifle or a sandbag for stability. The reactive targets were set at 25 yards away. This was a great introduction for many of the ladies, and they came away with a new understanding and appreciation of the rifle.

Boxed lunches were offered by Gator BBQ, with chicken, pulled pork, coleslaw, baked beans, and of course their fabulous banana pudding. No one left hungry!

2021 FLORIDA STATE PRECISION PISTOL CHAMPIONSHIP With Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP) Service Pistol & .22 Rimfire E.I.C. Match and National Rifle Association (NRA) Distinguished Revolver Match

The Florida State Precision Pistol Championships were fired at Gateway Rifle and Pistol Club, Jacksonville, Florida on October 16 & 17. Both Saturday and Sunday were beautiful days as 38 shooters from 7 states, competed in a great two-day event. Nestor Pena was the match winner, High Service category winner and was awarded the Florida Sport Shooting Association trophy as State Precision Pistol Champion. Daniel Kupar finished second, just 1X behind Pena, with third overall going to Randy Erickson. Seth Innes was the Master Class winner followed by Chris Liming who won the Expert Class and Todd Demi who took the combined Sharpshooter/Marksman Class. Daniel Kupar was the High Civilian, High Veteran and High Senior, with James Fleming winning the Grand Senior category. Kelvin Alleyne was the Metallic Division winner, with Chris Liming winning the High Police category. Jill Knerr was the High Women category winner, and Abbie Leverett was the .22 Only Aggregate winner and High Junior.

The CMP .22 Rimfire EIC match had 26 competitors. Abbie Leverett won the match with a 287-9X, Tom Davis finished second with a 280-7X and Robert Fanucci was third, firing a 279-5X. In the Distinguished Revolver Match, with 16 competitors, Seth Innes was the winner with a 266-4X, edging out Randy Erickson, who posted 260-3X. Finishing third was Tom Reardon with a 258-5X.

The CMP Service Pistol EIC, with 20 competitors, was won by Randy Erickson with a 274-4X. Tom Davis was second with a 274-4X and Chase Turner was third, firing a 270-4X.

The final event of the weekend's match was a "fun" event, The Second Amendment Freedom Match. Competitors fired "out of the box" pistols in an event where 50% of the proceeds were donated to the FSSA junior programs. Bragging rights went to Nestor Pena, shooting a Glock 9mm. Finishing second was Randy Erickson, shooting a Springfield Armory 1911A1. Most unique shooting device went to Tim Gozaska who fired a slingshot.

Range 3: Rifle 50- and 200-yards and Pistols with 10 inch Barrels or longer chambered for rifle cartridges

Range 4A: Same as Range 3 except 100-yards only


Range 4B: Rifles in rim fire .22 cal, .17 cal plus black powder rifles
